The role of non-state actors introduces asymmetric challenges that demand careful consideration in any comprehensive security strategy. Understanding their motivations and impact is integral to crafting effective responses to the evolving security landscape. Additionally, international interventions, while offering potential avenues for resolution, must navigate the delicate balance between external initiatives and the intrinsic security concerns of Israelis and Palestinians. This comprehensive analysis contributes to the broader discourse on conflict resolution and national security studies. It provides a foundation for informed policymaking and strategic planning, emphasizing the need for adaptive and context-specific approaches. As the Israeli-Palestinian conflict persists, the insights gleaned from this research serve as a call for holistic and collaborative efforts that address the multifaceted national security dilemmas, fostering a path toward a more stable and just future in the region.
